



<u> An Important Message on Fabric Disposal in MA (From Karen Howard)</u>

Effective November 1, 2022, new Massachusetts regulations will ban the disposal of textiles in the trash. Each year, residents of Massachusetts throw out more than 200,000 tons of textiles in the trash, including old clothing, towels, linens, and even bags, belts and shoes. For quilters, it includes our fabric scraps! Fortunately, there are a lot of places we can dispose of our fabric scraps and other textiles we may want to discard. The attached document is a list of local agencies that will collect fabrics (see attached), as well as other resources listed below. More on Baltimore Album Quilts



Baltimore Appliqué Society

Founded in Baltimore, MD, in 1993 to preserve antique quilts and promote the art of appliqué.

I have previously shared with you my particular preoccupation and fascination with the genre known as Baltimore Album Quilts (BAQs), as well as my original Baltimore. This fascination is likely borne of my passion for needle-turned appliqué, American history, historical quilting and all things needlework. I have carefully studied, researched and tried to replicate the appliqué work of Ellie Sienkiewicz and have read books by Mimi Dietrich, likely the foremost Baltimore Album quilt experts of modern times, to increase my knowledge and skills. I truly enjoy trying to do some things in the manner in which they had always been done before technology stepped in to do it for us (known as, the "old fashioned way"), and I often challenge myself with projects and tasks that our forbearers accomplished completely by hand, with limited resources and no speed-methods.

One such task is increasing the number of stitches per inch in my hand quilting. Expert, revered quilters in the past were known to hand quilt with *up to 17 stitches per inch*! Trust me, I have spent a good many years trying to accomplish this with every needle and thread available and to date, I have not reached my goal! I have quilted 9-10 and maybe even 11 stitches in an inch and the stitches are neat and appear infinitesimal to me, but they are only about half as small as those of the Ladies of Baltimore!! It is amazing how they reached that amount of stitches, often sewing late at night when chores were done, with hardworking, calloused hands, their quilting lit only by the dim glow of a single candle...

Since my eyes always seek information on all things BAQs, I also want to mention two interesting coincidences that came my way. First, the very limited Baltimore Album Quilt era (~1845-1856 +/-), for the most part was compromised of Methodist quilters and often centered in the Methodist Church. These "album" quilts were often a collaborative effort to present as a gift to departing Methodist ministers, depicting specific church and congregation-related scenes. How interesting that our quilt shows are held in the Whitman United Methodist Church! Some things really do come full-circle!

Secondly, I love to pick up old quilt magazines available at quilt shows to learn some of the techniques that may have pre-dated technology and I recently reviewed one in my "stash," that features the Baltimore Album genre, written by Jan Magee. You can find the article in the July/August issue of Quilter's Newsletter Magazine, 2001. Funny how these things keep coming my way.

One resource that I research and review frequently for ideas is the Baltimore Appliqué Society webpage (<u>Baltimore Appliqué Society (baltimoreapplique.com</u>). This group of Baltimore fans meets as a quilt group with functions and activities similar to those of Thimbles and Friends, and their webpage offers many interesting topics and resources. I hope you enjoy the journey back in time as much as I always do!

My other quilting passion focuses on the northern wilderness-lots of moose and bear appliqués, which so many people seem to gravitate towards as a quilt theme. I hope to share some of that with you, soon.



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Quilters' Recipes


