2004-05 Charity Project

The Guild needs people to volunteer for two events for the coming year. The first is a charity recipient and organize this. Involved would be to identify an organization that will benefit from the donation of guilts, contact them and ascertain their interest. You'd need to find out what size of quilt they need, type (childrens? Baby? Etc), and how many. We usually ask each guild member to contribute a charity quilt, so we'd be looking for an organization that doesn't need more than 30 quilts. You would need to share the information you collect with the guild members, noting that our annual charity workshop takes place during our January meeting. We have quite a bit of batting left over, so you probably would not need to arrange to purchase more batting. Once the quilts are done, you'd need to arrange for the quilts to be picked up by inviting a representative of the recipient to a guild meeting or collecting the quilts and delivering them. We hope to identify the charity coordinator at our September meeting, so let us know if you're interested. This is something one person can work on or it can be a couple of people.

Challenge

The second event we need guild members to organize is the annual challenge. Our survey results from last spring showed that the majority of guild members like the challenge and so the Board has decided to keep it as one of our annual activities. Coordinating the challenge means that you come up with an idea, and present it at the January meeting. Challenges are usually due at the May meeting. The challe4nge can include distribution of a fabric that everyone uses in their finished piece. Let us know at the September meeting if you'd like to take charge of this activity this year.

What is a Round Robin?

Every round robin is a learning experience. You use fabric you would never have chosen yourself, you're adding to a design it would never have occurred to you to work on, and (if you're sincere) you've designed your share in a way you've never tried before. It should go without saying that despite the difficulties -- or because of them -- you will exercise your skill as well as you can and use good-quality materials, so that no one has to fix your contribution in order to be able to get her own share done.

It is to be expected that both your contribution and what you get back in the end will be unique. There is no guarantee, nor should there be, that you will like what you're given to work on or what is returned to you at the end. I think it's marvelous that any round robin is exciting enough to be entered in a show, let alone win! But even the duds should be acceptable, because the work has been well done. Someone will love it somewhere! Finish it as a quilt or wall-hanging, and donate it to your favorite charity to be auctioned off, or just show it around and listen for a friend or relative to fall in love with it. The right person will get it and cherish it. And you will have added to your quilt designing skills, which is the main goal of the round robin in the first place. I have had 11 people sign up for this Round Robin. The September meeting will be the final sign up. I would recommend that you purchase betweean 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 yards of a focus fabric. Only if you want one specific fabric to be throughout your quilt (this is NOT mandatory).

We will be making a wall hanging. Approximately 36" X 36"

We will be doing this round robin in rows. Each row will be 6" X 36". You will be provided with a container (cost is \$2) to store your round robin. Each month you will be required to bring your container - with your row completed - at that time we will exchange containers accordingly. The first row will be made by you for your quilt. The final row - which will be the border will also be made by you for your quilt. You will not see your quilt in progress until the final border needs to be added.


Everyone who enters, must participate through to completion, so that all participating will have a completed quilt in the end. IF for some reason you chose to stop part way through or cannot complete the remaining months, you will be required to donate your project (which will be completed by someone else & used as a charity quilt - this is so that those that are still participating will end up with a completed project). THE FABRIC PLACE SATURDAY SAMPLER - THE \$5 QUILT

The fun starts promptly at 10AM Sat. Oct. 16th. You pay \$5.00 and get your first block, including pattern, fabric and directions. Make the block and bring it back at 10AM the third Saturday of the next month and receive a new block kit. Do this every month and make 12 blocks for only \$5.00.

The only rules are:

- 1. You must show up for the meeting and be on time.
- 2. You must bring your completed block from the month before. If you are late or do not have a finished block you must pay \$5.00 for the next block. Blocks are only available during the 20-minute meeting. You can register at any of the five Fabric Place Superstores

you live, married/single, children?, hobbies, pets etc.
