

Claire Gregoire is an historical interpreter at Old Sturbridge Village. Her specialty includes all aspects of historic textiles. She will present a talk with slides on the development of quilts and quilting in New England from the 18th and into the 19th century. She will bring examples of her

own work in historic reproduction quilts

In addition, she will demonstrate hexagonal patchwork (English paper piecing), which was the first form of piecing that came here from England and became popular in the 19th century when manufactured printed fabrics proliferated and were no longer a block printed luxury. She will supply us with directions, templates, and some pieces to try with a demonstration.

Please bring thread and needles, scissors and your favorite thimble.
